Sheriff's Message







Opioids

Opioids are medications with similar effects as opium from which they are derived.

- The intended purpose is to dull pain
- Prescribed by physician
- Manufactured on black market in clandestine labs

Fentanyl

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid with an intended use similar to morphine, but much more powerful.

- 50 100 X stronger than Morphine
- Prescribed to patients with tolerance to other opiates in severe pain
- Used as additive to Heroin to increase effects
- High potential for overdose

Heroin

Heroin is an opioid drug synthesized from morphine. Morphine is a natural substance extracted from the poppy plant – Opium.

- Smoked
- Snorted
- Injected
- Oral (Pill)

Identifying Abuse

Symptoms and Actions:

- Needle Marks / Tracks
- Dry Mouth
- Flushed Skin
- Runny Nose
- Constricted Pupils, Heavy Eyes
- Shortness of Breath
- Lethargic, Nodding Off
- Insomnia
- Sudden Behavior Changes
- Skin Infections
- Vomiting
- Scratching
- Slurred Speech, Confusion
- Complaints of Constipation and Nausea
- Doesn't Eat
- Covers Arms

Paraphernalia:

- Needles
- Burnt Spoons
- Empty RX Pill Bottles
- White / Tan Powder Residue
- Dark / Sticky Residue
- Small Glass Pipes
- Foil with Burn Marks
- Rubber Tubing
- Knives or Razors with Residue
- Micro Zip Lock Bags
- Corners of Baggies
- Wax Paper Folds
